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# Riders End With 0-12 Slate



With Spring just around the corner, "Doc" Young's baseball charges have started formal practice. As we look over the material with which the "old master" of the diamond has to work we find the majority of the candidates are untried and inexperienced.

Only George Wilson, Jim Blomberg, Sol Gittleman and Bob Modrak return from last year's sparkling team. Wilson undoubtedly is one of the best hurlers in this section, Blomberg is top-flight material at first base, Gittleman, with last year's experience at second base, will probably switch to shortstop, and Modrak will be more than adequate behind the plate.

How the rest of the starting nine stacks up is a big question mark. Second and third bases and the complete outfield still have to be filled and the success of the team will depend on the "good doctor" to field competent men in these positions.

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The third quarter, the visitors found the range and limiting the Green and Gold to a mere 7 counters increased their advantage to 22 markers leading 55-33. The Simestermen fought back in the final stanza, and outscored the Red and White. The gap was too large to close, however, and the game ended 72-56. McQueen, Zwerling, and Allaire had 16, 12, and 11 points respectively, in one of Drew's best played games of the year.

On February 25, the Drew courtsters journeyed to the "big city" to tangle with Pace College for the second time this season. Pace found us easy meat as they passed to a decisive triumph, 83-60.

Outscoring us in every period but the final, the homesters pushed to an 18-10 lead at the end of the first quarter. Resuming play, a tap by McArthur and a foul by Zwerling pulled the Riders to within 5 points, but that was the last time we were in contention. The Blue and White increased their lead to 43-27, at halftime. The hosts had no intention of relinquishing their superiority and poured it on in the 3rd period. Only after the Pace-men played their substitutes did the Green and Gold outscore them, with the final score reading 83-60.

High scorer, as usual, for the Simestermen, was Zwerling with 29 points, tops for the season. Von Geldern with 10 counters was second in scoring.

Two nights later, Drew returned to New York, this time going uptown to meet Hunter College. The "Hunters" scored a very easy 86-51 victory.

The Riders could not locate the hoop in the first quarter, and the hometeam took advantage of every break to jump to a 24-7 lead after the initial period. There was no doubt about the outcome, and they continued to pour it on, as they outscored the hapless Green and Gold in every quarter.
