

"Ruggers" to hold match with the Dean at J-Board

Hurst 24 has been repeatedly harassed by members of the administration. During the spring recess, the Plant Office was supposed to check the room to assure that the windows were locked, and all plugs were pulled out of electrical sockets. After the cursory check was over and the men left, Ralph Smith returned with a camera and took pictures of the disarrayed suite. He is now using the photos to J-Board the six students in the suite for willful destruction of university property. A party was held in the suite just before vacation where an unexpected large number of people came and left the place in deplorable condition. The members, however, have stated that they did not have enough time between the party and vacation in order to thoroughly clean and mend the suite. When they returned, the suit-mates proceeded to straighten it up. Unfortunately, the damage has already been done by taking the "before" pictures. Hopefully, the administration will re-visit the suite and determine their decision by the present condition, without being biased by the litter.

On April 5, 1974, Dean Nelbach sent correspondence to five of the six suite members requesting a meeting concerning their response to the accusation placed upon them. Unable to make an appointment within the requested time limit, one of the rugby players approached the Dean several days later in regard to their J-Boarding with no positive ends and little

response. Another letter from Dean Nelbach to the members of the suite was sent on April 9 withdrawing their priority numbers for this year's room selection. Feeling that this was unfair and uncustomary, several suite members went to talk with the Dean, only to get the threat of possible suspension placed upon them. This would make it impossible for two second semester seniors to graduate when they had planned, and it would deter the graduation of the other suite members. This unneccessary conflict provoked a great deal of static between the administration and the students involved.

At this point, all six suite members are subject to a J-Board hearing for willful destruction of university property without any consideration for the vast improvements and adjustments made in the suite during this last week. They are being tried for evidence that involved the disheveled conditions of the suite three weeks ago, with no evidence that any harm done was willful or intentional. The open J-Board meeting held on April 25 will determine the penalties or fines that may be brought upon the Rugby players. Primarily, the issues involved include the unjust withdrawal of the students' priority numbers before the J-Board decision, and the unwarranted search of the suite during spring break. The Acorn and the members of Hurst 24 strongly encourage the support of students AT the meeting.

# Student Stock Committee Continues Work

The Student Senate Committee on Corporate Responsibility is continuing its work concerning the critical issues that involve stock held by the University in such areas as political contributions and colonial exploitation in Africa. A meeting was held recently with two members of the board of trustees, Mr. Philip Haselton and Mr. Richard Kix Miller, and the student senate committee.

The Committee heard from the African Information Service in an informal address and presentation by Bob VanLeer concerning the plight of the natives in Guinea-Bissau, a Portuguese colony on the west coast of Africa, proclaimed an independent nation by the revolutionaries in that nation. At issue are the investments of several multinational corporations in the colony that hinder the natives' attempts at self-governance.

Also heard from was the United Council of Churches on the subject of corporate responsibility. Tim Smith delivered the comments.

The committee is continuing to write position papers on the various areas of responsibility and will present them to the Trustees Committee.

### On Campus Capsule Courses

\* A bomb blast caused minor damage in the office of the dean of student affairs at Louisburg College. It's believed the bombing may be related to student protests over female dorm hour rules at the small Methodist college in N.C.

\* A recorded voice gurgles, "Thank you, do it again," when students at C.W. Post College (N.Y.) drop trash into a special receptacle. The talking trash can was designed by a psychology graduate student who hopes to place a dozen of the devices on campus and improve the litter problem there.

\* The president of Central Washington State College joined other administrators and faculty in waiting on tables at a student banquet designed to help communications on campus.

\* The student newspaper of Euginio Maria de Hostos Community College, a 3-year-old, 2000 — student institution in the Bronx, is published in both English and Spanish.

\* While the overall crime rate decreased during the last year on the campus of Northeast Missouri State U., the number of incidents occurring during daylight hours, the eight a.m. to five p.m. shift, has increased significantly.

\* The U. of Virginia is starting a special 18-month co-op engineering program for women who already hold a degree in a non-engineering scientific field. A good engineering job market and federal equal employment regulations which, according to the program's coordinator, have caused employers to offer a 10% salary premium to female engineers, are expected to help make the program a success.

\* After the College Union Program Board (CUPB) at Queens College was criticized by the student newpaper, the "Pheonix," for spending \$4,000 to send 13 delegates to the recent National Entertainment Conference in Houston, the CUPB reportedly cancelled all future advertising with the "Phoenix" and signed an ad contract with another campus paper.

THE PROCEDURE FOR HANDLING MARIJUANA usage incidents in the U. of Minnesota dormitories was clarified for resident assistants in a letter from the acting director of student housing there:

FIRST OFFENSE — Verbal warning and an "incident report" filed with the U. housing office.

SECOND OFFENSE - Written warning and another "incident report."

THIRD OFFENSE— U. police called and accompanied to the alleged offender's room by a residence hall staff member. U. police may refer the case to city police or the matter would be handled by one of several campus judiciary bodies.

### EIGHT GUARDSMEN INDICTED BY GRAND JURY

(CPS) — Nearly four years after four Kent State students were killed and nine wounded protesting the American invasion of Cambodia a federal grand jury has indicted eight former guardsmen on charges of willfully violating the civil rights of the demonstrators.

The grand jury dismissed the theory advanced by author Peter Davies that the guardsmen engaged in a conspiracy to shoot students moments before they turned 180 degrees almost in unison and fired a 13 second barrage into the crowd.

The jury also did not cite any guard or state officials who had previously been criticized for contributing to the highly charged atmosphere that led to the shootings.

The 23-member panel spent one week reviewing 6800 pages of transcript taken in questioning 173 witnesses in sessions since Dec. 18. Five guardsmen were charged with felony violations — for deprivation of civil rights resulting in death — and three with misdemeanors. Conviction on the felony counts could be punished by life imprisonment

"This indictment is an indictment only," said Assistant US Attorney General J. Stanley Pottinger. "It is not a conviction."

The guardsmen pleaded innocent at their arraignment in Cleveland.

Pottinger also said the grand jury would not be discharged and could be reconvened to hear further evidence. It is possible new evidence could be uncovered during the trials of the guardsmen leading to more indictments.

The Daily Kent Stater said the indictments may "prove the key to a 'Pandora's Box' linking responsibility for the guard's actions to National Guard officers and civilian officials ignored by the grand jury."

Defense funds for the guardsmen have been established and Arthur Krause, father of Allison Krause, one of the four killed by the guardsmen, has said he will contribute.

"Of all people, I know how much it can cost to carry on a legal battle with the government," Krause said.

"As we have said many times, we are not being vindictive. Our battle is not against the guardsmen whom fate put on Blanket Hill that day," said Krause. "It's against the men who sent them there, led them, created an atmosphere of hatredand then blocked the truth for nearly four years."

Paul Keane, a Kent State graduate student who organized a petition campaign calling for a federal probe of the incident called the indictments "a big vindication." Keane said, "It's now on record that the students had a right to be there that day and didn't deserve to be shot."

Commenting on the delay between the shootings and the indictments plus the massive efforts made to secure a federal grand jury investigation, Keane said, "Anybody who says this is a vindication of the American system of justice is out of their mind. The people paid a tremendous price to get justice."

"We've been acting as prosecutors for three years, with the petitioning and hammering away at the government," said Keane. "They imposed upon private citizens the responsibility for getting the truth."

The jury left several questions concerning the tragedy and its aftermath unanswered, plus raised some new ones:

Who fired the first shot and what triggered the shootings? What part did FBI informant Terry Norman, who some claim may have fired the first shot, play in the shootings?

Why hadn't the original state grand jury, which exonerated

the guard, been shown the Justice Department summary of an FBI report that declared the guardsmen fired without warning to the students and that the guardsmen's men claim that their lives were endangered was fabricated subsequent to the event?

Why did it take so long to convene a federal grand jury and what explains the disparity between the actions of Atty. Gen. John Mitchell who found further investigation unwarranted and said "every possible action to serve justice had been taken," and the indictments just handed down?

\* The dorm dining system at the U. of Wisconsin-Madison is missing 3,000 plates, 5,000 trays and 27,000 assorted pieces of silverware since the start of the school year. Although some of the items will be recovered when students move out this summer, the losses still average nearly \$5 per dorm student annually.

\* A young married couple has been making soapbox appearances on campuses in California selling one-acre plots of land on the moon. The couple, dressed as space-people, draw amused crowds of students when they begin their pitch, but reportedly the government takes a dim view of the not-too-lucrative business.

# WASTE POWER, DON'T WASTE IT

(CPS) - "A nation that runs on oil can't afford to waste its garbage."

Recently major power companies in several large American cities have begun to heed this slogan and have experimented with solid and organic wastes as sources of electric power, oil and gas.

One of the problems of the American standard of living has been that it generates 125 million tons of solid wastes — from paper to automobiles — each year. In the past these wastes have been disposed of in open or landfill dumps which increase contamination of air, water and land as well as to insect and rodent problems. The solid waste output of cities has doubled in the past 20 years, and many large cities are running out of waste disposal capacity.

According to the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), 70-80% of these wastes are combustible and can be converted to energy. If all that refuse were converted, it would generate six percent of America's energy.

One successful attempt to utilize waste has been in St. Louis where every day 200 tons of waste are shredded and separated into combustible and noncombustible materials. The combustibles, such as paper, plastics, textiles, wood, rubber and leather, have been burned with coal in an electric-generating plant. The waste fuel has replaced 20% of the coal normally needed and when operating at full capacity will generate about five percent of the electricity used in St. Louis. The noncombustible materials have been sent to reprocessing and recycling plants.

At least 20 cities in the US have planned similar projects for waste utilization, including New York, Chicago, Boston, Philadelphia, Detroit and Washington, DC. A particularly massive project planned for Nashville will regulate the temperature in 27 downtown buildings with steam power generated by burning 720 tons of refuse daily.

Such projects could help cut down the US's massive consumption of resources, currently 143 million tons of virgin resources and 48 million tons of recycled material. According to the EPA, producing goods from recycled materials requires 74% less energy and 51% less water than making them from virgin materials.

The EPA has begun tests to determine the level of air and water pollution from plants like the one in St. Louis. Experts have estimated that pollution levels will prove no higher than those of conventional oil-fired plants and much less than those of coal-fired generators.

Also in the planning stage is a process called pyrolysis which will convert solid waste into a combustible gas or oil.

The production of methane gas from animal and plant wastes has already been proven practical. A farmer in Indiana has turned cow manure into gas to run his cooking and heating stoves, his lamps and his automobile.

A complete methane generator guide with diagrams and instructions has been printed in *Mother Earth News*. Reportedly the design has been simplified so that anyone can build a generator on a farm, in an apartment house or in a utility room for about \$400.

The gas produced is 55-65% methane and has a heating value of 600 BTU's (British Thermal Units), compared with natural gas which is 80% methane and has a value of 1,000 BTU's per cubic foot. One cubic foot of gas can be generated

from a pound of cow manure — enough gas to cook a day's meals for four to six people.

Among the products that can be used in a methane generator are corncobs, coffee grounds, straw, old newspapers, sawdust and leaves.

One of the most important student endeavors of the decade, the defacing and subsequent cleaning and repainting of The Ralph Plant Memorial Fuck Book Lounge (3rd floor Tolley, West end), went almost totally unnoticed in the scramble for heretofor unavailable Fuck Books. The simple fact is that this University spends as much time, effort and verbiage on the walls of its study lounges as it does lying to prospective freshmen about the school's quality.

Much multi-colored graffitti appeared on the Tolley Lounge walls during one week in early March: pictures, stories, slogans, drawings, and assorted comments representing a refusal on the part of a number of students to be disenlightened by this University. Needless to say, many "briefcase men" were not happy with the physical and moral damage done. After all, as Associate Dean Erickson pointed out on a later visit to the lounge, "Do you think people like the word 'Fuck'?"

A verbal battle with the 3rd floor R.A. (Kevin James) ensued, with much name-calling and shouting. The R.A., doing his utmost to help and understand his University-designated charges, apparently reported the entire incident to the Deans of Students Office. The following day (March 5) sophomore Eugene Lisansky appeared before both Deans at their request, and proceeded to admit complicity in the adventure. Mr. Lisansky ended up being designated "in charge" of the repair crew when he declined to list names for the Deans.

The students involved had little choice — it was either fix it themselves or allow the school to do their customary shitty job and charge them a fortune. Estimates for the cost of repairs to the lounge ranged from \$200 (the maid in Tolley) to \$750 (a group of hysterical students). Support for the project was, at best, minimal, and work did not proceed at all. The March 15 completion date rapidly approached, and work was finally begun on March 11, the same day Mr. Lisansky received the following memo from Associate-Dean Erickson:


What has been done about the walls on the 3rd floor lounge? Please remember that the cleaning and repainting must be accomplished before you leave for Spring recess.

E. J. Erickson

Work was begun that night with over 25 students present. Havor prevailed, yet a good time was had by all. Director of the Physical Plant Mr. Ralph Smith had been thrust into an advisory position, since he controls all the materials necessary for any repair work. Mr. Smith came to Tolley unannounced the next day and fired off the following memo:

Memo: Dean Erickson From: Ralph B. Smith March 12, 1974 Copy to: Lloyd Parrill, Gene Lisansky

After I received your memo today, I went up to Tolley to look at the walls to see what had been done because last week I had given Gene Lisansky some tri-



sodium to clean the wall. Someone I ad washed a little of the stuff off the wall but they had made quite a mess. There was a large puddle of water on the floor and they had gotten the furniture wet.

When I returned to the office Mr. Lisansky was in my office wanting paint. I told him that the wall was not ready for paint, that paint remover would have to be used first. After seeing how the tri-sodium water was splashed around I didn't think I could trust the same people to use paint remover because it is very caustic. If it got splashed around it would ruin the floor tile, ruin their shoes, and could put out their eyes.

I did not have time to talk to him more because I was already late for a meeting.

That is where the room condition stands now. I am afraid to give them paint remover, so I don't know how the damage can be corrected by the 15th. If they had started earlier they might have had a chance.

Mr. Smith was convinced to relinquish the paint remover from the Plant Office garage the following day. The instructions provided by Smith proved inadequate, and when the

My girl friend has a vaginal discharge — Does she have VD?



I heard that gonorrhea can only be passed on by way of the mucous membranes. Can you get gonorrhea in your nose?

You can't get gonorrhea in your nose but you CAN get syphilis ON your nose. Better keep your nose out of other (infected) people's business. Spirochetes, the germ that causes syphilis, can enter the body through open pores in the skin. These spirochetes are present in chancres and the rash associated with secondary syphilis.

paint remover was used in accordance with the directions, it ate through several coats of paint, hardened too rapidly, and fucked up everything, including the students' chances of finishing before the end of the month.

Hysteria was the mood of the day, until the students found someone who did (and does) seem to have student interests at heart, Lloyd Parrill, Tolley Hall Dorm Director. Mr. Parrill arranged a meeting in the Lounge with Associate-Dean Erickson (who had a Dorm Directors meeting in Tolley anyway), and a confrontation took place. After lashing out angrily at the students' failure to do the work, and myriad insinuations about their moral worth and masculinity of those present, Mrs. Erickson demanded of one student present if he did not find anything wrong with the present state of the Lounge. When the student replied that he did not, and Mr. Lisansky suggested that a consensus of the floor's population would reveal similar sentiments, Erickson repeated a previous threat about College Judicial Committee action. The students were told that if they removed all evidence of any writing from the walls, (so that visiting prospective students and their parents would not be subjected to it, or the disgusting beer smell on the Tolley West stairs), the project would be postponed until after vacation.

The words were removed (albeit with a large paint scraper) and all the students went home, to apply Associate-Dean Erickson's cogent moral value system to the "outside world," and rest up for the ensuing battle.

As exemplified in such landmark decisions as Miranda v. Arizona, the procedures which result in the subsequent prosecution of a criminal offender are as important as the trial of the offender. In other words, the constitution requires that specific measures be employed so that the citizens' right to due process not be violated. In Miranda, the Court extended its doctrine to include all levels of law enforcement action requiring a lawyer present. In short, the procedural norms which result in the arrest and trial of a suspected offender must not violate the constitutional guarantees of civil liberty. Indeed, one must then apply the Court's doctrine to all citizens of this University, if we are to develop as law-abiding Americans.

Hence, the current University policy which allows

maintenance men to enter students rooms for the purpose of repair, yet also extends to them police duties must be remanded as contrary to the spirit of student civil liberties. The Plant Office has no proper warrant nor authority which enables it to secure action against alleged violators of University policy. Hence, any information or observations reported by maintenance men to the Dean's Office cannot legally be enacted upon as it was clearly not obtained by use of a duly authorized warrant. Again, it is the procedural norms that are being questioned here, and not any violation in particular.

The following letter is illustrative of a specific instance in which the Plant Office overstepped its defined responsibilities and, in so doing, caused minor punitive action to be taken by the Dean's Office. It is necessary for the powers-that-be to reconsider this policy of unconstitutional substance, and revise it accordingly. MARC WEISS

## Letters

Dear Dean Erickson,

As per your request in our telephone conversation of April 16, I am presenting a complete statement of the alleged University rules of which I am held to be in violation of. However, prior to a statement of my considered status in the matter, I view it highly pertinent to state my convictions concerning the role of the Plant Office in its relationship to the student body. The Plant Office operates as the establishment in charge of repairs and maintenance of all physical structures on campus. However, it would readily appear that this major responsibility is sometimes tainted by the Plant Office assuming the role of internal security of which dormitory residents are the subject.

Hence, when I requested that necessary repairs be initiated in my room, I was under the assumption that the Plant Office would provide precisely that service and not trespass its purview into that of surveying whatever "illegal" conditions may have existed in said room. The logic operative in this assumption is quite simple. One does not desire to have his privacy invaded by Maintenance personnel who obtain entrance into a private room for the explicit and sole purpose of repair work, yet assume the role of authorized policeman when in that room. Thus, my guilt or innocence in any of the violations held against me may immediately be ruled out due to the questionable practices or procedural norms which resulted in the discovery of such violations. No University sanctioned warrant or security official was present to enable a consideration of my room's legal or illegal possessions to be legally and properly authorized. Indeed, it is upon the sole contention of the maintenance repairmen upon which even the smallest University punitive action can rest. Certainly, the principles of due process apply within the confines of any

action taken by an enlightened University. And, if so, then the question of my guilt or innocence need not be questioned. In fact, the invasion of my privacy by those employed by Mr. Smith deserve greater consideration.

Nevertheless, as noted in our brief telephone conversation, I shall present the facts as they exist in relationship to any of the violations of which I am held to be guilty of. First, the seven-week old dog which was found in my room by the Plant Office employee was there for a span of time less than four hours. The only reason why the dog was in my room was due to the dog owner's need to visit an ill, hospitalized Drew student confined to Overlook Hospital. As a result of hospital regulations prohibiting the visitation of pets, I agreed to allow the dog to stay in my room for a short period. The patient, Lisa Neidich, is a Freshman student enrolled at Drew, if verification of my case need be made. In addition, John Farnsworth, R.A., will testify to the fact that any reported violations no longer exist.

Although, the University may be in the process of taking punitive action against me for other reasons as well as that of the dog, I have not officially been made aware of them. Hence, I must rely upon your respect for the privacy of students against the illegal, unauthorized, and haphazard inspections of student rooms to take the proper action in this unfortunate

If any clarification of my statements are deemed in order, I will be most happy to present you with further information concerning my position.

Second, I highly respect the bias in teaching of each professor who has his own perceptions of education and teaching, and, if we truly believe in liberal students, they should not make other art education, he also has the right to establish and exercise his beliefs and values in order to achieve such goals in which he believes as a human.

Third, expecially today, facing the competition of tenure promotion and the financial crisis, the course evaluation may play a role as one of the tools of either the department or the administration for making these decisions. Sixth, there must be enough information circulating among students, on faculties and courses; therefore, without accusing professors publicly through the course evaluation, course selection can be done by each student while consulting with his advisor.

Seventh, regardless of the result which appeared in the course evaluation, students have to take certain courses in order to meet the requirement for graduation and their major.

Therefore, the course evaluation is merely a counterattack on the professors against their methods of evaluating students exams, grades, . . . .

conceive several points which students are trying to accomplish from the course evaluation, but unfortunately the course evaluation can be worth continuing only when departments and students fully cooperate in formulating the questionaire and in effectively implementing the results. Otherwise, it is wasting time and effort to repeat the same kind of evaluation every semester without any effective and immediate responses or changes. Since students have very little control or voice over the departmental decisions - practically none - the course evaluation has no legitimate function or constraint.

If there is a rationale behind this action taken by students, the course evaluation, it is to demonstrate one of the qualities or rather current characteristics of the liberal arts education which is widely understood among a large number of students as the broader participation of a student body in every aspect of college life.

#### **MOVIE REVIEW**

Dr. STRANGELOVE

If President Nixon were to see the weekend movie at Drew, Dr. Strangelove, he would call it a "vicious, distorted picture made by those who wish to tear down the institutions that have made this country great." The film, made by Stanley Kubrick of 2001 fame, concerns paranoid generals, kill-crazy Air Force men, incompetent civilian administrators and, most notably, a demented German advisor to the President of the United States. In other words the film, made in 1963, is a prophetic account of the way the world is being run.

The plot concerns what happens when General Jack D. Ripper, seeking to combat the insidious advance of fluoridation, breaks through the chain of command and orders a nuclear bomber squad to attack Russia. It is soon discovered that if the attack succeeds it will trigger off a Russian doomsday machine, with long lasting radioactivity, that will wipe out all life on earth. The move charts the course of the attack and attempts to stop it, closing with a surprise ending.

Some of the characters names are General Buck Turgidson, Major King Kong, President Merkin Muffley and Major Bat Guano. The acting, led by Peter Sellers in three roles, is in a very broad style. Geroge C. Scott and Slim Pickens are particularly outrageous, playing a sex-hungry general and a cowboy bomber pilot respectively. When Scott hears about the doomsday machine his reaction is, "Boy, I wish we had one of those." As can be seen the humor is in the broad style of something like National Lampoon. But this picture is far above that level, because the satire is focused on a central theme, which shows how man has all of this hideous machinery and yet still acts as if back in Neanderthal days. Also, Kubrick shrewdly underpins the satire with good story-telling, so that even when the humor flags the viewer is still caught up in wondering whether the world will be destroyed.

For those who pause in reverence whenever 2001 is mentioned, this work offers few of the same visual rewards, although there is some interesting model work with B-52's. However, Kubrick makes up for this with several incredible visual metaphors. One is the opening of the picture, showing two B-52's linked together as if in copulation. The worst one is the use of the Hydrogen Bomb as an unmistakeable phallic symbol.

The highlight of the film, though, is definitely the character of Dr. Strangelove. He is a German intellectual who wears glasses and advises the President in an accented monotone about what to destroy. Sound familar? Well, you're right. In what is the best indication that Kubrick is some kind of genius, he met Henry Kissinger in the early 60's and realized that this arrogant professor was an important indication of where the thinking of this country was going. So he put him in the film, with several changes. Such as making him a crippled ex-Nazi who has to struggle to keep a palsied arm from making a sieg-hiel salute. There is no pity in the satire and it's great. The film is worth seeing just for its merciless portrayal of the man who, as David Frye puts it, is "advisor to the President and Master of the World."

# SPOTLIGHT: The Electric Light Orchestra

The Electric Light Orchestra is probably the only group in recent history that couldn't come into being until its members signed a contract stating that they would be in another group at the same time that they were in the new band. With a claim like that the group has to be a little special, right?

The story of the Electric Light Orchestra dates back to 1969. A musical genius by the name of Roy Wood was sitting around deciding that he was very dissatisfied with his current band, The Move. Although he and the band had a string of hit singles that dated back to 1966. Wood wanted to change things. He had a dream of starting a group that would be a rock group with its own string section. He wanted to call his new band The Electric Light Orchestra. Wood took his idea to the other two members of The Move (Jeff Lynne and Bev Bevan) and they liked it as well. They started looking for some new musicians to fill out the new band.

## THE ELECTRIC LIGHT ORCH.

They hit a snag immediately. Despite Wood's famous name and his proven ability as a hitmaker none of the record companies wanted to take a chance on a new line-up and a new name. A compromise was finally reached with United Artists Records in England. UA would sign ELO with the condition that The Move would continue to exist with its present line-up, at least in the studio. Wood, Lynne and Bevan agreed and the contracts were signed.

The first ELO album was issued shortly thereafter under the title "No Answer." That first album was made by only four people. Roy Wood filled in on overdubs for the instruments they needed, playing almost a dozen instruments all told.

Shortly after the release of "No Answer" there was some sort of big fight in The Electric Light Orchestra. Jeff Lynne admits that he and Wood had mammoth battles, but to this day nobody discusses the cause of the trouble. The upshot, however, was that Roy Wood left his new band. The official press release said that Jeff Lynne was doing half of the work without getting credit from the fans, so Wood was leaving to give Lynne the spotlight. Wood took about half of The Electric Light Orchestra and formed his own band called Wizzard.

After some desperate searching for new people Lynne and company set to work on a new album, knowing perfectly well that the album would have to be a masterpiece if the group wanted to overcome the loss of Wood's prestigious name and talents. Lynne continued on guitar and retained Move drummer Bev Bevan. He added Mike DeAlberquerque on bass, Richard Tandy on piano, Moog synthesizer and harmonium, Mike Edwards on cello, Wilf Gibson on violin, and Colin Walker on cello.

The release of the second album, "ELO II," brought about the beginning of good times for the band. Among the five album cuts was a crazy version of "Roll Over Beethoven" that featured segments of Beethoven's Fifth Symphony interspersed with segments of the old-time rocker. It was a huge hit as a single in England and also did quite well for the group over here.

Following the release of the second album the group went through still more personnel changes. Colin Walker left for greener pastures and was replaced by ex-ELO member Hugh McDowall. McDowall had been touring with the group when Wood was around, but left with Wood to form Wizzard. He became dissatisfied in Wizzard and re-joined ELO. Wilf Gibson, meantime, got into some fights with Jeff Lynne over the band's musical direction. Lynne proved his superiority by firing Gibson and replacing him with a violinist named Mik Kaminski. The new band headed for the studio to do the third album.

That album, entitled "On the Third Day," is easily the best thing the group has done to date. It has gotten superb reviews as well as good sales figures. All of the tracks were written by Jeff Lynne except for one, an updating of Grieg's "In the Hall of the Mountain King."

One song that the group is currently doing on stage (and will, presumably, appear on the fourth album) is an updating of the old Beatles tune "Daytripper." The song opens with ripping fuzz guitar lines by Lynne and quickly turns into a hard-rocking version of an old favorite. In about the middle, however, Richard Tandy throws in a synthesizer run that

sounds strongly reminiscent of Bach. He is quickly matched by an equivalent line from the string section. From that point on the arrangement switches back and forth between rock and Bach. If this song is any indication of what is to come the new Electric Light Orchestra album will be nothing short of stunning.

Sue Konshack feels more feminine and the other girls mention the whistles they hear coming from the stands. And besides as one of them put it, "... When I look down it's still there." "It" refers to her femininity.

Most of the men enjoy having the women play. The men see the softball as mainly sport and fun. They don't see how the women hurt the team at all. In fact, they're ready to admit that the women play better ball than some of the men. About the only "complaint" came from a male pitcher who said that he became very distracted while pitching to a very female chest. Chauvinist!

On the question of large numbers of women playing softball in the future some men were cautious. They felt that the problem to be decided upon was whether the men would mind playing a less competitive more relaxed version of the game. Coach Reeves says that if there is a great response on the part of women to play that he would form a women's softball league. He agreed with the general consensus that women have jsut as much of a right on the field as men.
