Sports complex plans revised

Responding to budget shortfalls and sluggish fund raising efforts, the University released modified plans for the new sports and recreation complex this week. Costing significantly less than the previous \$15.3 zillion plan, the new proposal calls for construction of a makebelieve gym, to be completed within the

"You can pretend to play basketball, you can pretend to play tennis, you can even pretend to do aquatics-can you say, 'aquatics'?" chief architect Fred Rogers said. "Make-believe is very healthy."

The new gym will be 45 stories tall, contain 12 basketball courts, three airconditioned jai alai arenas, a concert facility that will seat 60,000, and individual hot tubs for each student. In addition, the complex will provide parking for 200 make-believe cars.

"This plan is really much more costeffective than the other," Director of Facilities Operations Jim Maloney said. "Also, in this gym, anyone can do a slam

dunk or bench press 400 pounds."

Maloney is encountering difficulty recruiting make-believe workers to build the make-believe gym, particularly in light of the University's make-believe

Director of Public Safety Tom Evans, while doing the backstroke through the tennis court lot, said, "Heck, I like this idea already! I've already broken three world records for the backstroke and

University President Tom Kean, while presenting the new plan to an angry mob of "concerned" students, said he believes the facility will help Drew recover from its student shortfall as an attraction to prospective students. "It is the acom that will become the mighty, albeit make-believe, oak," Kean said. "With this gym, Drew can fulfill its long-term, short-term, and middle-term goals, completing my vision of the University in the Forest."

After students raised objections to the plan by burning the president in effigy, he calmly turned around, dropped his pants, and mooned the audience.

A record 3,000 ballots were cast in the recent Student Government Association elections, according to Elections Chair Ellice Oston. "We were thrilled to see such enthusiasm, especially since we only have 1,400 students in the College of Liberal Arts. Usually only about 400 vote," Oston said.

Haselton purchased Offer alleviates budget problems

A Japanese investment firm came to the aid of Drew's budget woes this week with a record-high offer to purchase Haselton for \$1.5 million. The firm plans to close the hall for two years, after which it will re-open as a Jack-in-the-Box fast food joint.

Although concerned about the disruption to campus, University President Fom Kean said he saw this as the best solution to the budget deficit. "At least we'll finally have a good place to get tacos," Kean said.

Apparently dismayed by the news of Haselton's purchase, Director of Residence Life John Ricci said, "It wasn't my decision. I wasn't on campus that day. I didn't have anything to do with it, it was locusts—a terrible flood! It just wasn't my fault."

Director of Admissions Roberto Noya said he expects problems in a few years once the declining demographic trend reverses and the number of incoming students increases. "Until then I'm not sure the administration sees any point in worrying about that. Why plan ahead?"

A spokesperson for the investment firm said major renovations are necessary before the building will pass inspection by the Board of Health. Upon preliminary inspection, various forms of radioactive waste and mutated squirrels were found in the basement, he said. "This building would have a hard time passing inspection by a 14th century monk who was accustomed to dealing with towns infested by the Black

Haselton's unique architecture also

camming, for those of you who are unfamiliar with the term, refers to the process of putting the moves on a prospective sexual interest. "If we can keep the big guy healthy, if he can keep his head out of the clouds, if he is able to adapt to our offense, if he doesn't break too many backboards, if he can be an effective shotblocker, then we should be all right next year," Masco said.

Bradley's arrival will balance the loss of junior Scott Moody, who will bypass his senior year at Drew and declare himself eligible for the NBA draft. A crowd-favorite for the past three years, Moody has high hopes for a career in the pros.

"With NBA expansion to Dubuque and Fargo, ND, there's a good chance I could hook up with a club," Moody said. "That would be nice. There aren't many good forwards coming out this year, so I have an outside shot at being in the lottery. That would definitely be nice."

Masco seemed unphased by Moody's departure. "He really didn't fit into our plans anyway with Bradley coming in," Masco said. "Besides, I think Scott's ready to go."

Tom Kean decreed that the Drew bear will be replaced by the elephant as campus

mascot. "The elephant will better symbolize our university," Kean said. Despite complaints from students that no elephants live in the forest, Kean went ahead with the

College Republicans President Scott Serviss said he will urge students to fill the role. "Since announcing volunteers for the mascot, over 300 students have applied for the position," Serviss said. "I guess we are all elephants at heart. Hail Bush! Hail Bush!"
