- 1. Hartshorne says of Radhakrishnan's concept of the "pre-cosmic nature of God" that it "should mean, not God before the creaturely process, but God in <u>abstraction</u> from every particular form or world-constellation which this process has actually taken. For, as all such forms are contingent, we are at liberty to conceive alternatives for every one of them, and the pre-cosmic nature is merely what all such possible forms have in common. Not before but <u>in</u> all times, actual or possible, is the meaning" ("Radkahrishan on Mind, Matter, and God": 321).
- 2. But, <u>mutatis mutandis</u>, one could also conceive a "post-cosmic nature of God," which would be God as necessarily <u>including</u> every particular form or world-constellation which the creaturely process has actually taken and as destined to include every potential such form or world-constellation. Thus not after all times, actual or possible, but all times, actual or possible <u>in</u> God is the meaning.
