THE STUDENT VOLUNTEER MOVEMENT

THE RECORD OF 1914-15

“**A**MONG the influences which are making towards the development of the spiritual and religious life of students and directing this life towards the evangelization of the world,” recently wrote a theological professor, “none is comparable in importance to the organization known as the Student Volunteer Movement for Foreign Missions.”

A Secretary of a Foreign Mission Board recently wrote as follows of what the Movement has meant to his Board: “Let me express my appreciation of the work that is being done not only for the foreign field but for the colleges and universities of this country by the Student Volunteer Movement. It seems to me that there is not now in existence a movement that so clearly apprehends or so consistently follows the great spiritual ideals of the New Testament. It has always been the policy of our Board to cooperate with the Movement and to help and heartily welcome help from the Movement, but we are hoping that in the future this relationship will not only be strengthened in its good-will, but may become more and more practical in its operation.”

And the Secretary of another Board refers to the Movement as a mighty citadel of missionary influence, prayer and activity in the colleges.

The field of the Movement embraces all classes of institutions in Canada and in the United States. By its propaganda fully 1500 different institutions have been reached and upon not less than 1000 of these it has brought to bear one or more of its agencies with such constancy and thoroughness as to make an effective impression for foreign missions. This has resulted in the dedication of life on the part of Christian students to the missionary work of the

Church both at home and abroad. Many testimonies similar to that of the theological professor quoted above could be given. The helpful contribution of the Movement has not ended with what has been done for foreign missions. In all the institutions reached the reflex influence on the religious life of the students has been most powerful. It has resulted in the deepening of spiritual life and the dedication of many students to the work of the Church at home.

To understand the far-reaching character of the contribution which this Movement makes to the missionary life and activities of the Church at home and abroad, one should always keep in mind the fourfold purpose of the Movement. This is stated by the Executive Committee as follows:

1. To awaken and maintain among all Christian students of the United States and Canada intelligent and active interest in foreign missions.
2. To enroll a sufficient number of properly qualified student volunteers to meet the successive demands of the various missionary boards of North America.
3. To help all such intending missionaries to prepare for their life-work and to enlist their co-operation in developing the missionary life of home churches.
4. To lay an equal burden of responsibility on all students who are to remain as ministers and lay workers at home, that they may actively promote the missionary enterprise by their intelligent advocacy, by their gifts and by their prayers.

Reports received from missionary agencies show that 278 Student Volunteers were accepted and sent to the mission field during 1914; and that 329 reached their fields during 1915. On pages 18 to 30 of this pamphlet may be found the names of these new recruits, the countries to which they were assigned, the educational institutions where they were trained and the Boards by which they were sent out so far as the information could be secured.

Since the origin of the Movement in 1886 at the first Student Conference held at Mt. Hermon, Massachusetts, 6490 Student Volunteers have been accepted by the mission-

ary agencies of the United States and Canada and sent to the mission field. The following table shows the countries to which these Student Volunteers had been assigned according to the records in the Movement's office on December 31, 1915:

All these Student Volunteers were sent out by the missionary Boards and Societies of the United States and Canada. The Student Volunteer Movement sends out no missionaries. It is in no sense a mission Board or sending Society. Primarily it is a recruiting agency.

Its work is done through Secretaries who travel among the institutions of higher learning; through conferences and conventions for students held in different parts of Canada and of the United States; through promotion of missionary intelligence, by means of voluntary classes for the study of foreign missions; through distribution of missionary literature suitable to students; through meetings of various kinds in educational institutions of all grades; through enlisting students to give for the support of foreign missions; and through the work and influence of individual Student Volunteers and the Student Volunteer Bands in different in-

stitutions. The fourfold purpose of the Movement (see page 4) gives a full statement of the objectives of the Movement. Everything which is done and all the means which are used, have as their objective the attainment of that fourfold purpose.

The Secretaries, who travel among the institutions of all classes in all parts of Canada and the United States and work at headquarters in New York are the most effective agencies employed by the Movement. The following illustrates the far-reaching influence of their work:

While visiting a small college a Student Volunteer Secretary was, under God, able to help an undergraduate at a crisis in his spiritual life; ultimately the student became a Volunteer for medical missionary work in China and an active Christian worker. On finishing his college course the Volunteer continued his preparation for foreign missionary service in a medical college. During his first year there another Secretary of the Movement visited the medical college. The Secretary, on learning that a young Chinese student had recently entered the medical college, suggested that the Student Volunteer could begin his service for China at once by becoming a friend of his fellow student, the young Chinese. The Student Volunteer saw that he would not have to wait until he got to China before entering upon his life-work. He could begin at once and he did. It required patience and tact, but the Student Volunteer did not become discouraged. Having made the acquaintance of the young medical student from China, he introduced him to Christian professors and to Christian people in the community, invited him to join a Bible class in one of the Churches and in every way possible performed the offices of friendship to his fellow student. During the summer vacation he invited his Chinese friend to accompany him to the Student Conference and then to his own home for a long visit. This genuine, unselfish friendship won the heart of the Chinese. Within the next three years the Volunteer had the joy of seeing his friend baptized and join the Church.

The Student Volunteer Secretary is always ready to take advantage of every opportunity to present the cause of foreign missions. At one of the universities a secretary upon invitation of the faculty gave addresses to thirteen of the regular college classes in the departments of Colonial Government, History, Political Science, and Political Economy. The theme discussed was "Christian Service for American College Men in the Orient." In another institution the secretary was invited to speak to the four classes in the Medical School. He addressed the sophomore class in the dissecting room on "The Medical Opportunities for American Physicians in the Orient." The address of the secretary was followed by a ten-minute talk by the professor, who told the students that the work of medical missions was one of the most far-reaching opportunities that had ever been presented to his classes; one of the students reported that this was the first time he had ever come to consider medicine as an altruistic profession with an opportunity for world service.

In one of the large medical centres the subject of "Medical Missions and Young Physicians" was presented to the hospital interns and medical students at a parlor meeting held in the home of one of the prominent physicians, where the urgency and importance of the opportunity of the present situation in China was presented. As a direct result of this meeting we know that one medical man who was about to complete his internship in a hospital is soon to be sent to the field by one of the missionary societies.

The following comes from a Student Volunteer Secretary now on the mission field: "One of the greatest joys of the year has been the opportunity to carry on the work of the past three years. Letters from all parts of the country have come to me out here, telling of problems to be solved, decisions made, and life purposes formed. Nothing could have come to me that would make me more thankful for those three years of wonderful opportunity as a Student Volunteer Secretary in the colleges at home. An interesting thing happened this spring, however, that made

me more grateful for the way God can use the volunteer message. I happened to meet a girl who came out a year ago to do evangelistic work in a town west of Nanking and the first thing she said to me was 'I talked with you three years ago during your visit at the University of Illinois and I am out here to-day largely on account of that visit.' I could not remember her among the many girls talked to on that visit, but it made me feel very humble to think that she reached China before I did. Those years at home with the Movement mean more to me than ever since coming out here. Letters came the other day telling that three people, who decided to become foreign missionaries during visits at their respective colleges, are to sail for China in the fall—one from Wellesley, one from Dickinson and one from Cornell—and so it goes."

During the academic year 1914-15 the traveling secretaries of the Movement made 707 visits to institutions of high learning throughout Canada and the United States. Five hundred and twelve different institutions were visited, 874 addresses to students, 314 chapel addresses, 167 addresses to other than student audiences, 6159 personal interviews, 1867 interviews with Band leaders and Association leaders, 1426 interviews with professors, attendance at 413 Volunteer Band meetings, and 593 committee meetings.

During the year covered by this report twenty-nine Student Volunteer Conferences were held in different parts of the United States and Canada. There were in attendance 3471 student delegates and 138 faculty delegates from 385 different institutions. These totals do not include those from the colleges in the towns in which the conferences were held.

A Secretary of experience writes of these conferences as follows: "The conferences conducted by the Student Volunteers have done much to develop leadership among the students themselves. Comparatively few students within a college generation reach the quadrennial International Conventions of the Student Volunteer Movement. These smaller conferences reach a large number of students, who bear

most gratifying testimony as to the benefits received. The martial note of the Movement; its breadth of vision; the challenge of its Watch-word; the addresses on mission fields; the presentation of opportunities for life-work; the call to service, and the uplifting power of spiritual dynamics—all these come to the students in attendance on one of these conferences. In addition, the conferences are of very great value to volunteers out of college. In the case of many volunteers, there is a period of one or more years between graduation and the date of sailing to their mission field, during which time they teach or engage in some other form of service. They are out of touch with their volunteer bands, and sometimes are lost to foreign missionary service. The Student Volunteer conference is for these detained Student Volunteers most helpful in keeping them in vital contact with the great forces of the foreign missionary movement. The conferences also afford mission board secretaries an opportunity to meet with the Student Volunteers of their own denominations and to gather much personal information about the candidates, which is helpful to them in making appointments. The responsibility of these local conferences rests upon groups of students. It is very encouraging to see the effective way in which this responsibility is carried by the students themselves. They work out the program, secure the speakers, bring together the delegations, and carry the conferences through. This develops the undergraduates, who are thus acquiring experience which will be most helpful in the work which they have before them."

Before the Student Volunteer Movement became an active factor in the institutions of higher learning comparatively little was being done to educate students on the subject of foreign missions. Very soon after the work of the Movement began, an extensive program of missionary education was inaugurated, which has grown in efficiency with each year. At the present time comparatively few Christian students graduate without having the facts of missionary progress brought to their attention; through meet-

ings in the interest of missions conducted at regular intervals by the students, through the circulation of missionary literature, through lectures and addresses by missionaries at home on furlough, secretaries of mission Boards and the secretaries of the Student Volunteer Movement; and through voluntary group classes for the study of missions. These classes have grown from less than thirty in 1894 with about 200 enrolled to the following figures reported for the year 1914-15: 37,542 students enrolled in 2458 classes in 591 institutions. Of the total enrolment, 15,878 men were enrolled in 1161 classes and 21,664 women were enrolled in 1297 classes. On page 33 will be found additional statistics.

The work is under the direction of the Educational Secretary and an Assistant Educational Secretary. They prepare text books, suggestions for leaders of mission study groups, circulars, pamphlets bearing on the study of missions, visit institutions of higher learning, attend conferences and conventions and conduct a voluminous correspondence. The effectiveness of the methods employed is shown by the progress which has been made.

There are marked advantages in connection with mission study among students. It develops an intelligent and strong interest in the foreign missionary enterprise. These mission study groups are doing much to make such interest permanent. It is of great value to students who are preparing to become foreign missionaries. It creates conditions favorable to decisions for foreign missionary service. It helps those who are to be leaders at home in Church and in State to become intelligent citizens of the world. It helps to overcome provincialism and is a helpful influence in deepening the lives of Christian students.

Even more important than the marked increase in the number engaged in mission study and the advance recorded in the production of new courses has been the steady improvement in the quality of the mission study work. This is due primarily to the strong emphasis placed upon the qualitative aspect of the work by the leaders of the Mission

Study Department. More attention has been given to the selection and training of teachers for study groups, especially at the summer conferences. The literature on the subject has been enriched. The coöperation of college and seminary professors has become more general and helpful. The attention paid to such subjects in the curriculum of our institutions has also had an indirect but strong influence. Moreover, the closer correlation of mission study and the Bible study and social problems study has contributed in a marked degree to the improvement of all these activities.

A member of one of these mission study groups writes as follows of the great value of the study: "Three years ago I was a member of a mission study class which met weekly in my room in school, after the day's classes were over, and we studied Dr. Mott's 'Decisive Hour in Christian Missions.' I think that book opened our eyes to many things of which we had known but vaguely before, and it led us at that time to take up a collection for the famine-stricken Chinese. I do not know what other fruit the study bore except in my own case. I had been giving to church and mission causes all it seemed that I possibly could for a long time, and being constantly hindered by frequent serious illnesses, it seemed as though I could not see my way clear to do any more. That book, and the collateral reading we did, however, compelled me to adopt the tithing system which I have followed strictly ever since. This had enabled me to give considerably more."

From its earliest days the Student Volunteer Movement has emphasized the responsibility of students to give to missions.

For the academic year 1914-15, of the 1020 institutions from which reports were received, 682 contributed \$218,652.81 for missions at home and abroad. (See tables on pages 31-32.) Of this sum members of faculties, friends, and former students gave \$94,422.80; the balance, \$124,230.01, was given by approximately 62,061 students. The average gift for each student was approximately \$2.00. Three institutions report per capita gifts by students as

follows: The Nyack Training Institute, whose students gave \$7.00 per capita; St. Paul's School, \$13.00 per capita; and Misses Masters' School, \$14.25 per capita. Of the total amount contributed, \$147,620.30 was for foreign mission work; \$71,032.51 for the work in the home lands. On pages 31-32 will be found a list of institutions reporting \$300 and over. In the list of 1914-15 there are 27 institutions which either did not contribute or failed to report contributions of \$300 and over for 1913-14. In the list for 1913-14 appear the names of twenty-nine institutions, which do not report as much as \$300 for this year.

The largest sums were given by the following institutions:

At Princeton 600 students out of a total of 1615 gave \$2,000; at Pennsylvania the students gave \$1,571.88; the number of students out of the 7500 matriculated who contributed is not reported; and 800 of the 3300 students at Yale gave \$1,700. This sum of \$218,652.81 does not represent the total gifts of the students of Canada and the United States as it does not take account of the gifts made by students to the churches of which they are members.

The significance of the figures lies not so much in the amount reported as in the educational value of the process of securing the contributions. It is no small achievement to secure gifts from more than sixty thousand students. It will be much easier for these students to continue their gifts to missions after graduation than it would be for them to begin if they had not faced their obligation to support missions financially during their student days. The Movement is thus helping, year after year, to raise up and train efficient organizers and administrators for the missionary work of the Church.

From the beginning the leaders of the Movement have

realized that they were responsible for bringing the Student Volunteers into contact with their Mission Boards. This phase of work has continued to grow in volume and importance. Each year the Movement has been of greater service in helping various Boards to find candidates needed to fill posts in the field. The office of the Movement serves as an indispensable clearing house between the Candidates and the Mission Boards. This work is under the direction of the Candidate Secretary and the Assistant Candidate Secretary. They receive the earnest coöperation of every other Secretary of the Movement and a large list of correspondents who render increasingly valuable service in searching for the men and women required.

At regular intervals bulletins containing the latest information regarding the men and women needed by the Boards of Canada and of the United States are issued. Special letters and circulars are sent out as new openings are brought to the attention of the Candidate Secretary. A large correspondence is kept up with hundreds of prospective candidates. The result is that large numbers of these are saved to missionary work at home and abroad. And no small number are led to offer themselves for the work because of the calls for workers which are thus brought to their attention.

The value of this work to the Boards may be illustrated by the following extract taken from the report of the Home Department of the American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions in 1914:

"We gratefully acknowledge our indebtedness to the Student Volunteer Movement in this department of work. The Movement is well officered and is conducted in hearty coöperation with the mission boards. Its services were never more appreciated than in the past year. This organization, through the activities of its New York office and the visits of its travelling secretaries, is, under God, producing a steady stream of missionary volunteers. In addition to this general and fundamental service, it stands ready to serve the Boards

in the finding of specific workers as occasion arises. For example, when our Board last winter was in need of an architect for China and no such special worker was forthcoming in our own constituency, the Student Volunteer Movement found for us an excellent candidate."

Candidates qualified to meet some of the calls are found promptly, others are found only after a long search. The following typical instances will illustrate:

On December 2, 1914, a call for a teacher of psychology and English for a Government college in China, was received. It was urgent that the man be at his post in China by January 10th. Within two hours after the call was received, twenty-five letters went from our office to Volunteers qualified for this position, and on December 19th, one of the men to whom we had written sailed for China. This man has since written thanking us for being the means by which he is having this wonderful opportunity in China.

In 1911 one of the Boards sent a call for a medical missionary for an important and difficult post in one of its fields. After three years of effort to find a doctor qualified for this post, we suggested to the Board secretary the name of a man who proved to be the man needed, and he is now on the field.

The following quotations, taken from letters received from Student Volunteers, will convey to the reader some conception of the spirit which characterizes the true Student Volunteer:

From a Student Volunteer now working as a missionary of one of the Boards in Turkey; "The Student Volunteer Movement meant more to me than any single feature of my college life in keeping me true to the high ideals of service set before me in my boyhood days. I volunteered at the close of my high school course and I am yet unable to see why men can decide for law, business, the broker's office, etc., at that period of life and be thought perfectly able to reach such decisions but not able to decide to give their lives to the service of the King in the part of His field where the need is certainly

greatest. May God bless the Student Volunteer Movement. I pray for you and for all of the Secretaries each week. Saturday is your day. I find that it is better to divide up the people and the interests for whom I pray and spend some real time on each one than try to crowd them all into each day. Prayer turns so easily into merely running over a long list of names and I would rather associate myself with these friends and these world movements in a way that is not possible if time is not spent seriously and prayerfully on each one separately."

From a Volunteer now a missionary in China who did not find it easy to leave her home and get to her mission field: "In the first place I want to say that we are more thankful every day that the way was opened up for us to come to China at this time. If I was enthusiastic about coming during the three years which elapsed before I could get to the field, I am a hundred times more enthusiastic about being here, and it is our daily prayer that God will give us the health and strength and power that we need in order to make our lives count for the very most. You know all about the need and the opportunity out here so I will not go into it except to say that it is far greater and far more urgent than I had ever dreamed of."

From a Student Volunteer who has not yet reached the field. This extract illustrates a spirit which is found among those who are working hard to overcome the difficulties they must overcome in order to secure the preparation necessary for foreign missionary service: "My health has always been good. My family is poor, not exactly needy, but in circumstances such that any immediate reverse, as sickness, would necessitate my return home. I shall have considerable debt to pay upon graduation. I am trusting that I may put my life where it will count most for the glory of Christ and the propagation of His Kingdom. I suppose I am in the same position as many others, a desire and faith in struggle with physical necessities. I see the need, feel the responsibility, have formed the purpose, and now through

faith hope to work out to the end that work God seems to have put before me."

From a Student Volunteer who has not yet finished her preparation: "If I knew which Board would give me the hardest place, the place for which there are fewest workers and most work, then I would know which Board is *my* mission Board, for I long to go to the place where no one else wants to go and do the work which is most neglected. If you know of any field of Christian work which is more neglected and more in need of workers than the foreign mission field, I'll stop preparing for foreign mission work and take up the other work."

Before going out to the foreign mission field many of the Student Volunteers use their vacations for active work for Christ and His Church, and their labors are often most fruitful. The following extract from a letter shows what one volunteer was able to accomplish in his home town during a summer vacation: "My home is in a town of less than a thousand people. Practically all the population are members of the Church. But religion to many is formal and perfunctory, and the boys are going to waste. 'Why can I not do something to help?' This question ran through my mind one afternoon last Spring and would not be dismissed. With a short vacation before me I went to work. My one motive was to help. My chief method was prayer. The local ministers were drawn together in a weekly meeting for study, consultation and prayer. Later, six of the older girls were organized into a group for intercession and personal work. A month elapsed, and we organized a similar group among the married ladies, then one among the boys, and a few weeks later a group among the married men. Much prayer was being offered. The Holy Spirit was evidently at work. I knew of no young men in the community who would stand for Jesus Christ when others opposed. But God did. He brought him to me. He was the machinist in the knitting mill. Working together we were instrumental in leading the village blacksmith to Christ. The blacksmith

had been the 'runner' for the blind tiger. He brought a bright brained college boy, unable to secure work on account of drink, and I was enabled to win my next door neighbor, who had been a confirmed drunkard for years. Thus the work goes on, and I believe it is just beginning.

"The Intercessory Bands have grown rapidly. The original group of girls has organized two other groups and one of their number who volunteered for foreign missions, returned to her college and began a similar spiritual work there. The group of ladies has organized five other groups and the men and boys have doubled their number. One out of every eight people in the community meet weekly in these circles for intercession.

"I have not been there for months. Others are doing the work. I was only used to begin it. They have suffered disheartening defeats and have enjoyed glorious victories. Hours are being spent in believing and self-giving intercession, and men and women are being constrained to come into the Kingdom of Christ through the power of love and of prayer."

In Table I appear the names of 278 "sailed" Student Volunteers reported to the office of the Student Volunteer Movement since the list for 1913 was published.

In Table II (see page 23) are the names of 329 reported during 1915. The reports show that they are connected with more than fifty missionary agencies. Only names of those who sailed before the end of the calendar year 1915 are included in these tables. On December 31, 1915, the total sailed list was 6490. (See page 5 of this pamphlet.)

The General Secretary of the Student Volunteer Movement will be under obligations to anyone calling attention to Volunteers who sailed during 1914 or 1915 if their names do not appear in these lists.

In the table abbreviations have been used as follows: C=College; H=Hospital; M=Medical; N=Normal; S=Secondary School; T=Theological; Trs=Bible, Deaconess and Missionary Training School; U=University; v=Volunteered at.
