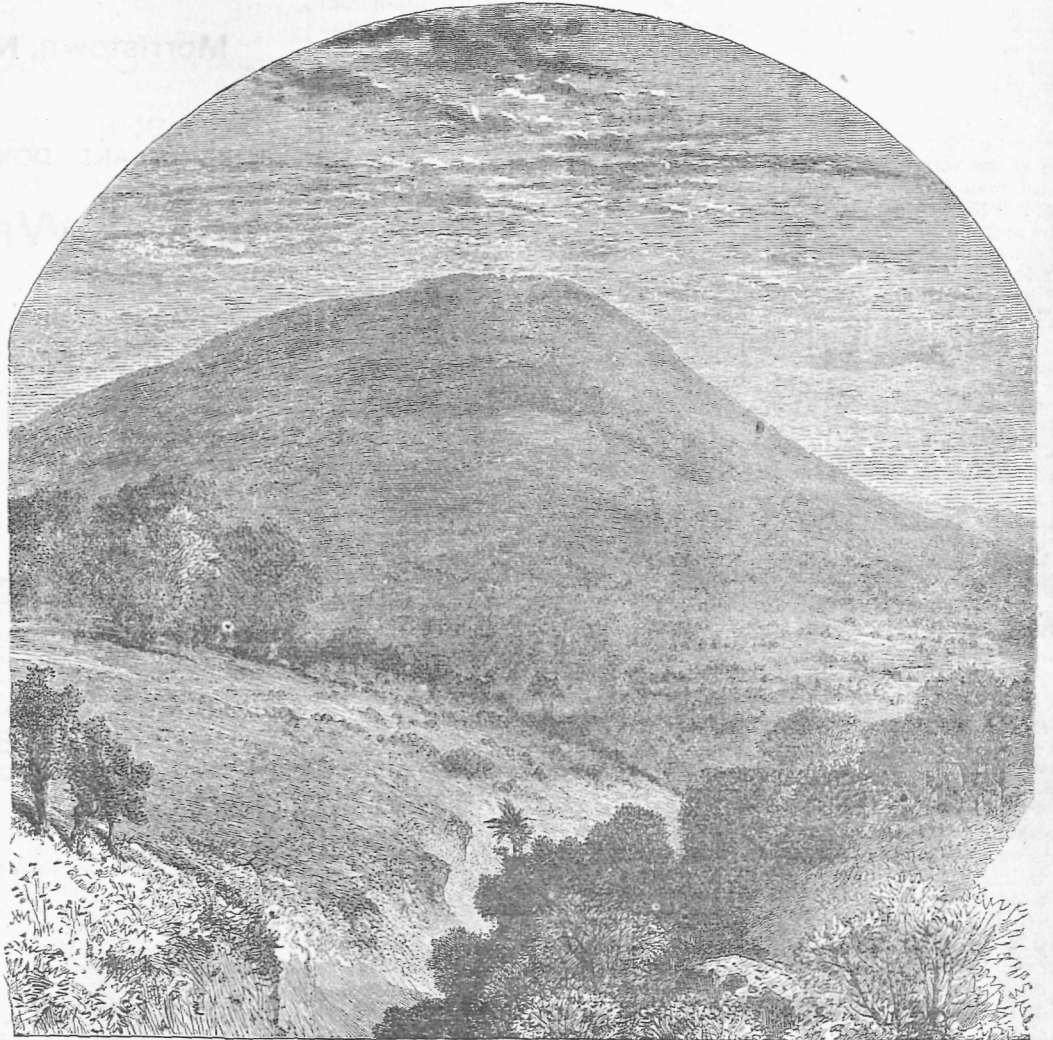

## Mount Tabor.

Desiring to gratify and instruct our  
 readers we present at considerable ex-  
 pense the above beautiful representa-  
 tion of old Mount Tabor. This  
 sacred name for our camp ground was  
 suggested by Rev. C. S. Coit, who at  
 the time was chairman of the commit-  
 tee on improvements, who also named  
 the buildings "Ebenezer," "Bethel,"  
 "Tabernacle," &c., &c., and also the  
 names of most of the avenues and  
 parks, which were approved by the  
 committee. The natural beauty and  
 holy purposes to which the place was  
 to be devoted, suggested the name as  
 being appropriate.

Old Mount Tabor was richly adorned  
 with verdure, forest and flowers, which  
 is true of this beautiful place. From  
 the summit of old Tabor, which was  
 1,350 feet high, the prospect was grand  
 and beautiful. Old Mount Tabor is a  
 mountain four or five miles in circum-  
 ference at the base, rising like a great  
 round topped sugar loaf, standing in  
 lone grandeur on the great plain of  
 Esdrelon. On the Mount are found  
 piles of old ruins, the remnants of old  
 fortifications, that have existed from  
 the days of Joshua.

The prospect from its summit is  
 grand, Mount Carmel on the west, the  
 sea of Galilee on the east, with Jordan  
 flowing like a silver belt southward—a  
 territory replete with thrilling histor-  
 ical events and heroic names.

Mount Tabor was again and again  
 baptized with blood in war. It was  
 here while the Canaanites oppressed  
 Israel that Deborah, by the direction of  
 the Almighty, gathered ten thousand  
 men under the command of Barak. At  
 the base lay Jabin's great army, an im-  
 mense multitude, with nine hundred  
 chariots of iron, under the command of  
 Sisera. At the given signal Barak  
 descended from the Mount and smote  
 the vast host with the edge of the  
 sword.

This signal victory was celebrated by  
 a song by Deborah, renowned for its  
 sublimity and beauty. (See Judges V.)  
 Napoleon Bonaparte, near the close  
 of the last century, visited Mount Tabor  
 and added another baptism of blood.  
 An immense Turkish army of fifteen  
 thousand infantry and twelve thousand  
 cavalry was drawn up in battle array.  
 Klebar marched out of Nazareth with  
 three thousand men, attacking an army  
 of twenty-seven thousand. For six  
 dreadful hours he fought against this  
 fearful odds, piling up heaps on heaps  
 of the slain. At a critical juncture  
 Napoleon is seen with another division  
 wheeling down from Mount Tabor.  
 The Turks were driven down upon  
 Jordan, when Murat charged upon  
 them with his cavalry and decided the  
 fate of the day.

But if Tabor was made gory by thou-  
 sands slain in battle, it has been  
 crowned with glory from the presence  
 of the Divine Master and celestial  
 visitors. Jesus took Peter, James and  
 John to this Mount, and Heaven and

earth have a deeper interest in the  
 scene than in all others that cluster  
 around it. Moses the great lawgiver,  
 and Elijah the chief of prophets ap-  
 peared. See Matt. xvii.

## Our Mount Tabor.

HISTORY, ETC.

At the Newark Conference, held in  
 Washington, Warren County, in 1866,  
 it was resolved to hold a Conference  
 camp meeting, and a committee of two  
 ministers and two laymen were ap-  
 pointed from each district, to select a  
 place and to make arrangements for  
 the same.

The place selected was in Morris-  
 town, where for three successive sea-  
 sons the meetings were held. These  
 awakened such a deep interest in camp  
 meetings, that it was resolved to pur-  
 chase grounds for a permanent place.  
 George T. Cobb, Rev. James M. Tuttle  
 and Rev. J. T. Crane were appointed  
 a committee to select a site. The  
 same persons were a committee to  
 secure a charter from the State legis-  
 lature. October 21st, 1868, it was  
 resolved to purchase the grounds  
 of Messrs. W. H. and N. Dickerson,  
 about 30 acres. Subsequently there  
 was added the farm purchased of Ste-  
 phen Dickerson.

The following persons constituted  
 the original Board of Trustees: \*Geo.  
 T. Cobb, James M. Tuttle, \*James V.  
 Bentley, \*J. T. Crane, Jos. Gatchell,  
 \*Ichabod Searing, Amos Hoagland,  
 Milton T. King, \*J. B. Bassenger, C. S.  
 Coit, \*Peter Smith and Henry A. Buttz.

At the first meeting of the Board the  
 following officers were elected: Presi-  
 dent, Geo. T. Cobb; Sec., J. V. Bentley;  
 Treas., Rev. J. M. Tuttle.

At a meeting held April 2d, 1869, the  
 work of laying out the ground, building  
 the preachers' house and stand, arrang-  
 ing for the water works, &c., was com-  
 menced, and also making the necessary  
 arrangements for holding the first camp  
 meeting on this ground, to commence  
 Aug. 23d, 1869.

At this meeting Mr. Tuttle presented  
 a form of by-laws and constitution  
 which was adopted. At this time none  
 expected Mount Tabor would become  
 a summer resort, a city of cottages,  
 hence the mistake in making the lots  
 so small. After the purchase of the  
 farm the lots on the hill were made  
 much larger and many of these plots  
 are already adorned by beautiful cot-  
 tages with modern improvements. The  
 trustees have expended a vast amount  
 of money in improvements on build-  
 ings, water works, avenues and parks,  
 and a still larger amount has been ex-  
 pended by private individuals in the  
 erection of cottages. Families from  
 Newark, Jersey City, Hoboken, Brook-  
 lyn, New York and many other places  
 now have pleasant summer homes in  
 this charming retreat, where they drink  
 in vitality and physical vigor from the  
 pure, bracing air and as clear, soft

water as mountain springs can give.  
 This is the fourteenth annual meeting  
 held on this consecrated ground. Great  
 changes have taken place since we first  
 met; some who were deeply interested  
 in its prosperity, ministers and trustees,  
 have passed to their reward. Every  
 meeting has been a success, and there  
 have been unmistakable evidences of  
 the presence of the Master.

May the ensuing meeting be more  
 glorious than any that have passed, for  
 the displays of the Divine glory, and  
 multitudes see the salvation of our  
 God as they have not in the past!

## Wednesday's Services.

MORNING.

The Rev. F. A. Mason, of Bernards-  
 ville, N. J., preached to a large congre-  
 gation this morning from the following  
 text:—"First John, 5-14—" And this is  
 the confidence that we have in Him;  
 that if we ask anything according to  
 His will, He heareth us." Our subject  
 is prayer as a force. A force is an ac-  
 tive power—vigor, energy, power not  
 quiescent on earth, but active and ef-  
 fective. The world is full of forces.  
 Heat, light, cohesion, gravity—all  
 these are familiar ones. But forces  
 operate also in the mind; ambition,  
 fear, hate, self-love, public opinion.  
 These operate no less surely in the  
 mind than the others in the material  
 universe. Nay, we may go still  
 higher and see clearly that men's souls  
 are the subjects of force, which influ-  
 ences them in the world of spiritual  
 things. We have but to remind our-  
 selves of Abraham's faith, of David's  
 loyal service and Paul's devotion and  
 zeal. Now we know and recognize  
 forces as such by the effects they pro-  
 duce. In fact a force may be defined to  
 be "that which produces an effect."  
 The world is full of changes—changes  
 constantly going on, and each one is  
 brought about by a force or forces, and  
 each must be preceded by a force which  
 has produced it, just as surely as that  
 for any effect presented there must be  
 an adequate cause. Conversely, a force  
 existing, a change must be produced.  
 When in the spring of the year we sud-  
 denly behold the apple orchard all  
 smiling and radiant with beautiful  
 blossoms we realize the force of the  
 sunbeam. We do not see, or hear, or  
 taste German continental thought in  
 our neighboring cities in regard to the  
 Sabbath, but we perceive the effect in  
 the debased public opinion concerning  
 the Sabbath and the consequent pro-  
 fanation of that holy day. The universe  
 is a Cosmos—which is defined by  
 Humboldt to be "a system of law,  
 harmony and truth." The universe is  
 not a mere conjunction of things and  
 ideas discordant, or even disconnected,  
 and between which there is no neces-  
 sary relation, but it is a system, every  
 part of which has a close and intimate  
 relation and connection with every  
 other part. God is the centre of this  
 universe. It is one because of His

power, His wisdom, His love. Now these things we must keep in mind if we would comprehend any part of His creation, whether in things material, mental or spiritual. This is an age of specialties, and from this very fact arises the danger that we should become narrow, partial, and in a degree untruthful in holding to the truth we think we have found. "Truth is one, as God is one," and must be, because God is Truth. But we, in our excess of ardor and in our too quickly found conclusions, and in the lack of that humility with which we ought to enter into the temple of truth, have seized upon laws, facts and principles, have duly labeled them like specimens in a museum, and have said this fact belongs to natural history, and has no relation to mind or morals—it belongs to the world of material things. This principal is a law of mind, and belongs alone to pure intellect, and this again is a law of right and wrong. It has reference to the soul, and it is purely spiritual. Now all this is wrong. Truth is not only in itself truth, but it is connected with every other truth, whether the other be a fact or a principle. This atom of dust upon this pulpit has an existence of its own, but it has likewise a definite relation to the entire world, to the solar system. And so of every other truth. True, for the purpose of being more exact we may classify truths, and say this is religion, and this is intellectual, etc. But let us be careful how we arbitrarily partition off that temple of truth in which God sits supreme. That must be a false or defective philosophy which will not regard the domain of truth as one, and God supreme over all.

The Bible and the Saviour himself constantly recognized this oneness of related truth, inasmuch as in making known the spiritual truth, the facts of material nature are found to be the most available by which to illustrate that truth.

The universe is one whether we look at it from its material, mental or moral side. Its administration is one. "All things work together."

The instinct which impels us to seek for harmony in the truths of science or religion is a higher one than that which leads us to evade the difficulty by pretending that there is no relation between them.

It was conclusively proved by Hugh Miller that the traits and powers of the human intellect correspond with similar powers in the mind of God. "Come now let us reason together," says the Almighty, and in the Bible we read "The laws of nature are the thoughts of God."

Since God created man in his own image, and since "In the beginning God created the heaven and the earth, and even the hosts of them by the breath of his mouth, all the forces of man and all the forces of the material creation have emanated from God.

Now among these multitudinous forces of God, is prayer, and though prayer be spiritual in its aims and in its character, it is just as reasonable that it should have a place in God's administration as that the forces of electricity or gravity or public opinion should have each its place. That prayer is a force, we know, because it answers the definition of a force in that it affects changes. Like other forces it emanates from God. See how it works. You have in England an unconverted brother dangerously ill—you are concerned for his spiritual safety. Making use of one of God's forces, you send him a cable message of sympathy and love. Making use of another of God's forces, also available to you, you offer up an earnest prayer to God full of faith for his conversion. The force of electricity has availed to get to him beyond the seas the message you sent, and the force of prayer has availed to get him reconciled to God. It matters not that the one is a spiritual and the other a physical force. Both are forces in the domain of God.

And yet there are those in this age of speculation, that admit the one, while they deny the other. Prayer say they is a superstitious weakness of feeble minds. Nay we retort, it is you who exhibit a narrow mindedness and unphilosophic spirit. Indeed you wish to obtain an entire divorce between forces ruling in the natural world. But we say, and facts prove, that the administration is one, and "What God hath joined, let no man put asunder."

An idea has prevailed in the minds of many that since God is an unchangeable being it is useless to pray to Him; or on the other hand, if God grant us a request he would be inconsistent with Himself. God's character is unchangeable, and the principles of His administration are ever the same. In this sense he says "I am God and I change not." But this so far from discouraging our prayers, is an encouragement to lift up our hearts to Him in supplication. The principle that compels him to frown upon and punish the rebellious is quite consistent with that which makes Him rejoice to have mercy upon the penitent. Professor E. B. Hurley has written these judicious words upon the subject: "Prayer does not call upon God to alter the established order of his administration but to act conformably to it. Prayer and the answer to prayer have been provided for in the constitution of things. "Known unto God are all his works," etc, is a principle that takes in all of God's order—mental, material or

spiritual. Prayer is a force available to us, but it bears strict analogy to every other force in that it is conditional. God's law has a sphere in which it operates, and we must respect the conditions regarding it before we can avail ourselves of it. There is a moral sphere in which prayer operates; it is—"Ask and ye shall receive." But we can only avail ourselves of the force of prayer by fulfilling the laws and conditions under which it operates in the Providence of God.

The doctrine of prayer then, instead of making strong drafts upon our credulity, presents to us as sound philosophy as any of the laws which govern the physical world. How precious are all the promises of prayer given in the Bible. Experience bears out the theory to the utmost that theories demand. It is not the testimony of St. James alone, but of united Christendom that "The effectual fervent prayer of a righteous man availeth much."

(The speaker here read a long list of illustrious examples of answers to prayer given in the Bible.)

The history of the triumphs of prayer, is the history of the victories of the Church of God. "Ask and it shall be done unto you." Not a godless, blind, materialistic system of development but the Lord God omnipotent reigneth, and he reigneth upon this ground, as he reigned upon the Sinai of old.

Are there hearts this morning saying, Oh that I might know the secret place where I might find my God! Oh that I might come up and possess the land. Oh that I might be fed as my hungry soul demands off the table of the Lord. Dear friends the way is open to you, this force of prayer is in your spiritual keeping, avail yourselves of it and the blessing will come to you.

AFTERNOON.  
Rev. E. S. Jamieson, of Elizabeth, preached the afternoon discourse to an audience of about two thousand people. It was considered by all who heard him, a fine effort. The text was—"And he brought him to Jesus." The scene was laid on the banks of the Jordan, that famous river in Bible history. The lesson we are to learn from this act of Peter's is the joy of our reward for having brought souls to Christ. The truest affection of man is that which not only manifests an interest in the body but an interest in the souls of others also. No man can foresee the results of having been the instrumentality of saving even one soul. It is like the seed dropped carelessly in the earth, springing up into the mighty oak, which in time grows to produce the forest. The reward shall be great and glorious. In closing the speaker said, "Let us not therefore be weary in well doing. Un-saved man or woman, we come to you to-day with this invitation from our Master, surely the best, wisest and safest thing you can do is to accept it here and now. We ask you intelligently, in all the earnestness of our souls, What do you mean to do with the Christ that stands back of Andrew, and back of the message he brings. Herod plotted for his death, the Jews crucified him, infidelity has scoffed and scepticism sneered, and the world for two thousand years has been trying to destroy the Man and His Book. But Christ lives, and all the doctrines embodied in this tender note of invitation can never be destroyed, for they are as immortal as God Himself."

Mr. John P. Berry, of Newark, has sold his cottage on Embury Place to Daniel A. Morrison, of Jersey City. Mr. Morrison will improve the property largely.

Rev. S. A. Burns is doing a good work in our midst. The meeting in Bethel Wednesday afternoon was attended by a large concourse of people, so that there was not even standing room in the Pavilion. There were a number of seekers.

Have you not noticed the dead tree alongside of the store? We have discovered the cause of its drooping. It will be noticed that Whit, the boot-black, sits under the tree every afternoon with his kit, and he carries a pipe strong enough to kill the Dead Sea.

Camp Tabor is "booming" now, cottages and tents are full of residents and their visiting friends. The Mt. Tabor House is overflowing. Mrs. Lyon's cottages have a goodly number of guests, and we seem to have the promise of still larger crowds to-morrow and next day.

The 1 o'clock meeting in Bethel is increasing in interest and effectiveness. Mr. Lowrie remarked this morning that he never saw as much interest manifested at any meeting as is being developed here. Many souls have found peace and the tabernacle is crowded at every service.

The young people's meeting in Ebenezer at 6 P. M. every day conducted by Dr. Lowrie, is as usual one of the most interesting features of the ten day's services. The Pavilion is packed full of the youth and beauty of the encampment at each service, and all join in saying, "It is good for us to be here."

A cottage has been recently built by Mr. Harper, on east side of St. John's Avenue, about midway between Trowbridge avenue and St. James Park.—This is a fine two story cottage, with basement kitchen. The cottage presents a cheerful, comfortable and attractive appearance, for which the painter is entitled to his share of the credit.

What a marked change is seen in the camp meeting of to-day as contrasted with that of our forefathers. We will say nothing of the thriving village of rich and comfortable cottages, but the tent life and the tent itself, that, with its snowy canvas, carpeted floors, lace hangings and luxurious fittings is a thing of grace and beauty, are all on a plane with our advanced civilization and refinement.

Mr. Cronham, of Jersey City, has built a very neat and attractive cottage on East side of West Hedding Place, just North of Strowbridge avenue.

As a rule the cottages here are painted with the trimmings in a darker color than the body of the building. Mr. Cronham, however, had the boldness to make a wide departure, and reversed the rule by making the body of his cottage a rich cream tint, putting the trimmings in white. This gives his cottage a light, cool, and cheerful appearance; and the great contrast offered by the green foliage with which it is surrounded produces a pleasing effect that meets with general admiration.

The death of Mrs. Vansant, who a day or two before she passed away visited Mount Tabor, brings to mind a familiar form also cut off suddenly in the midst of usefulness. Rev. P. K. White, who was graduated at Drew Seminary in May last, who for a number of years was the acceptable chorister of the Morristown M. E. church and who had been a yearly visitor to Mount Tabor, died suddenly at his charge in Port Monmouth on the 20th of July. He was ill but three days, death resulting from cholera morbus. Mr. White was the son of Rev. L. D. White, of Utica, N. Y. He was a young man of promise, and while of a retiring and unassuming nature was earnest and faithful to the work to which the Lord had called him. For some weeks previous to his death his pastoral work taxed his strength severely, and when attacked by disease his physical forces were illy prepared to combat it.

On the west side of West Hedding Place, just south of Strowbridge avenue, the Rev. John Timbrell has just completed a nice cottage. This is a convenient distance from the Circle, and it is not far enough up the hill to make it a "hard road to travel." Mr. Timbrell's brother-in-law, the Rev. Mr. Vanderhoof, has also just built a cottage of about the same style and size on Banghart Place on the west side of the avenue, fronting also toward Simpson avenue.

Further along, (at the last cottage on the east side of West Hedding Place,) we find the genial Mr. Brown has made a very important improvement by the addition of a wide verandah along the whole length of the southern side of his cottage, connecting with the one in front. Much comfort and pleasure may be had in surveying the magnificent scenery that may be viewed at great advantage from this porch.

The Young People's prayer meeting is again a favorite means of grace to large audiences. Among those who participate in its exercises are many who found the Saviour through the blessed influences which surround it, while there are hundreds throughout this Conference, and we may say in various parts of the world, whose eyes kindle and whose hearts warm as they dwell upon the precious moments spent within its sacred precincts—moments which to them, perhaps, determined their happiness here and hereafter.

**The Record's Pen Sketches.**

RICHARD GRANT,  
JERSEY CITY, N. J.

Richard Grant is one of the laymen to whom Mt. Tabor is greatly indebted, both for time, labor, and thought expended in its interest. He is a native of New York, but for many years has been a resident of Jersey City, and is now a member of the "Centenary" M. E. Church. By the Methodists of Jersey City he is too well known to need the introduction furnished by this sketch. Mr. Grant is a good representative of the energy, push, and enterprize of his native city. His business is dealing in cooperage supplies, and by pluck, industry, tact, and square dealing, he has become one of the leading merchants in his line. Nor does he forget as an official of the church the injunction to "provide things honest in the sight of all men." Piety with him includes care in making obligations and promptness and certainty in meeting the same. Brought to seek Christ through a deep conviction of sin, and a consciousness of his own inability, he found satisfaction only in the no less confident conviction that God's Spirit had brought to his mind the testimony of pardon. Religion to him has no meaning unless it has dissipated all doubts, and has made sky and pathway bright with the sunlight of God. Hence it is to him a source of constant and incomparable pleasure. Mr. Grant is a man of strong convictions, and is fearless in stating and supporting them. What he understands to be right never has to beg for his support, for he is always loyal to principle. We believe he would die cheerfully rather than disobey the voice of God.

When he became a resident of Tabor, he brought with him the enterprize, and industry that had characterized him elsewhere, and it was not long before he was called to be a trustee of the association. As vice-president of the Board of trustees, and member of important committees he has expended a large amount of labor and money in improving the grounds. Under his direction new avenues have been laid out and old ones improved. The magnificent entrance to the ground was constructed under his superintendency. All improvements to which he gives his attention are paid for, have utility and adornment for their object, and show honest and substantial work.

The home of Mr. Grant on St. James Square is one of the features of the ground. It is ample in proportion, elegant in appointments, unostentatious and hearty in its hospitality. Its well tended garden is a source of pleasure to all that visit it, or see it as they pass by.

Despising affectation, and without assumption, Mr. Grant is accessible to all, and readily responds to genuine calls for help. But woe betide the hypocrite who falls into his grasp, for his unlooked form will be apt to leave in battered condition. His own immediate family and that of his son-in-law, Mr. A. Campbell of St. John's ave., are greatly prized by the residents of Tabor. Mrs. Grant, like her husband, enjoys the simple elegancies of life, but has a wholesome hatred of shams. With him she shares a love for the church; an interest in its welfare and joy in its prosperity. May they long be spared to make Tabor their summer home.

The Rev. Dr. Thompson, of Grace church, Brooklyn, has built a gem of a cottage on West Park Place fronting St. James Square; thus giving a fine never-to-be-obstructed view of distant mountain ranges both to the north and east. This is indeed a very desirable location, the ground being level for some distance in every direction from the house, which stands 709 feet above sea level, or as high as any cottage here.

This cottage also has the modern improvements, and on the East side has a tower from which much pleasure may be derived in viewing the surrounding country. Magnificent views, the real grandeur of which must be seen to be fully appreciated, may also be obtained from the porch and balcony of this cottage. Mr. Thompson is a preacher of rare ability, has a great fund of humor and is exceptionally entertaining, thus making him very popular wherever he is known. S. M. Mattox, Esq., of Rockaway, who has built a large majority of the cottages here, was the contractor and builder.

Many of those who are otherwise pretty well acquainted with Mount Tabor affairs entertain the mistaken idea that it is a community of Methodists only. Recognizing the many superior advantages of the place—its perfection as a summer home for children, the bracing mountain air, the pure spring water, the beauty of its location, the quiet home comforts that have given it the title of a "haven of rest," its nearness to the great cities and the merely nominal cost of living—the people of many denominations have sought the shade of its groves and erected some of the cottages that gladden the sight of those who have an eye for the beautiful. 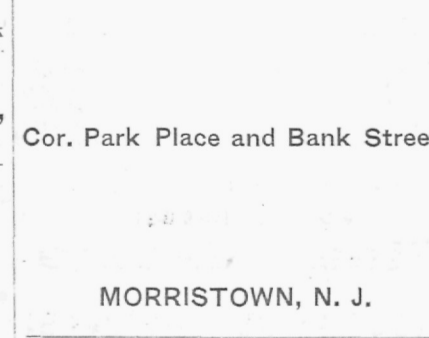

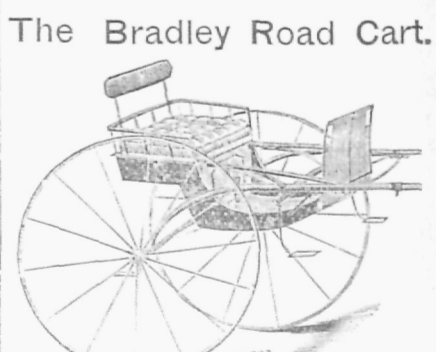
